Nativity "BUILD GUILD" Competes in Robotics Competition



Nativity formed a lego league robotics team last fall and participated in a ten week season culminating in a competition with 34 other middle schools. The science and technology competition had a bio-medical theme of "Body Forward". The Nativity team had to construct a robot as well as build a complex course filled with challenges modeled after real-life medical problems, like setting a fractured bone or placing a pacemaker into a heart. Once the robot and the course were assembled, the students had to work together to create programs that would allow the robot to compete in as many challenges as possible in a two minute time frame. In addition to the robot

challenge, teams had to research a medical issue and come up with solutions to these problems either by proposing a

new medical invention or improving upon an existing invention. Teams had to present their research and solution to a panel of judges. The Nativity Build Guild decided to "tackle" the problem of football-related concussions and decided they would invent a gelatinous substance to be injected in between the skull and brain to reduce brain trauma. Clearly, an out-of-the box idea. Despite the pressure of competition the Build Guilders represented Nativity well and found science was as much about teamwork as it was about technology. The students still have weekly sessions to hone their skills and our goal is to have both a boys and girls team in next year's competition.



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From the Principal

As we start to wind down our school year, the Nativity dream continues to unfold. Our students just completed their standardized tests and are now working on completing their final school projects and exams. Our Accelerated Reader Program

has been very successful in encouraging our students to read and since January our thirty four students have read over five hundred books! We look forward to adding another grade in September at which time Nativity Preparatory will have its full complement of $5^{\text{th}} - 8^{\text{th}}$ grade. We are ahead of last year in the flow of perspective students, and parents are always impressed with the manners of our students, the quiet classrooms, the structure of the day, and the cleanliness of the school as they walk through the hallways.

I am most grateful that all of our dedicated staff will be coming back next year. They are a committed group of educators who have put their hearts and souls into the mission of Nativity and I feel fortunate to have them as colleagues.

We have our summer camp plans in place for July and August and we are grateful to Loretta Yatteau for again taking on the role of Director, and McQuaid Jesuit for providing the facility for the two week academic sessions and Father Brian Frain for coordinating the space as well as staffing for the enrichment part of the program. We will also be returning to Camp Asbury for the one week overnight camp experience that was such a terrific growth experience for our students last year.

As I write this letter we are a week from the wonderful feast of Pentecost and I can't help but reflect on how much the Spirit has guided this Nativity dream through our second year. We have been blessed to have a strong Board, advancement committee, education committee and enrollment committee who continue to guide and mentor me and the direction of the school. Most importantly we have been blessed by many generous donors, volunteers and friends who not only give to our mission financially but also of their time and talents.

Staff and students alike are looking forward to those "lazy, crazy, hazy days of summer". However, please know all of you will be very much in our prayers of gratitude as we close out the school year with our Mass of Thanksgiving on June 23^{rd} .

Accelerated Reader promotes love of reading



Accelerated Reading is a national reading program which has been introduced at Nativity with great success. The program has been found to be a very powerful tool for urban youth in encouraging students to read for enjoyment and understanding. Students read a book and then take a test on the computer to see if they understood what they have

read. Students receive immediate feedback and if they pass the test

with an 80% or higher they receive the points listed on the book which are tied to a reward and recognition program. To date, our thirty five students have **read over 500 books** since January and have accumulated more than 1,800 points. Even more exciting is that we often hear our students comparing authors, encouraging a peer to read a certain book and having their own "mini" book discussions.



Poetry For Learning

Mr. Lott has been using poetry in his ELA classes as a way to get the students to express themselves both on paper as well as orally in presentations. It has been wonderful to see students who arrived painfully shy open up and become more confident in their ability to communicate their thoughts to others.
