Meet Our Students

This year we added eighth grade and we now have a total enrollment of 44 students with 25 boys and 19 girls across 5th through 8th grade. Over the next few years we will continue to add students targeting full enrollment of 80-90. Attendance continues to be excellent averaging 96% and over 95% of our students qualify for the federal free or reduced program. One of the gifts we



enjoy is tremendous diversity. Our

students come from families representing over 20 nationalities. We have Catholics, Christians, Muslims and Hindus. This diversity has provided us with a wonderful opportunity to learn about other cultures and religions, not just through textbooks, but through lived experiences. This provides a wonderful opportunity for true understanding and acceptance as our students grow into adulthood.





Nativity Students Excel in Photofinish 5k Event

Nativity students helped raise money for the school and honed their running skills during the Photofinish 5k fundraising event sponsored by the George Eastman House.



Over a thousand runners participated supporting over 60 charities in the Rochester area. It was a great experience for our students and all tolled, they raised over \$4,000 for the school from individuals who sponsored their involvement. In addition, Nativity received the Wegman's Educational Prize for being one of the top fundraisers which included an additional \$1,000 donation. Our thanks to Bill & Victoria Cherry for getting us involved and covering the registration costs and to all of you who provided donations to sponsor our runners.



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From the Principal

I am sitting in my office and have just finished conferences with all of our eighth grade parents and students. This has been an exciting year as we have instituted our eighth and final grade here at Nativity. The first phase of the Nativity vision will soon be completed and now we take the vision to another level, as we work at placing our students in college prep high schools and follow them through these next four years.

All eleven of our eighth grade students have visited each of the Catholic High Schools, and now with

their parents, need to make the very important decision of "Where Should I Go?" It has been so rewarding to see how these young teens have matured and grown in these last three years. They have been pioneers in many ways and they have proven that the Nativity model does work.

A few weeks ago we were honored to have Bishop Clark visit our school. After celebrating Mass he visited the classrooms. I was very touched as our 8th grade students responded to the Bishop's question, "Of the five virtues in your pledge, which do you feel has been the most challenging to live?" I extend those words of gratitude on behalf of our students and their parents to all of you, our generous, faithful donors, our dedicated volunteers and the many who have supported the dreams of our Nativity students and the vision of Nativity over these last three years. Nativity "Build Guild" Robotics Team Competes

Nativity Preparatory Lego Robotics is back in full swing this year with a seventh and eighth grade team and a coed 5th and 6th grade team. We had 13 students who competed with 22 other teams on Saturday, November 14th at McQuaid Jesuit in the "Lego Robotics Challenge." Ms. Geniviva, their coach, worked many long hours to prepare both teams for the competition. The theme for this year's competition was "Food Factor". Students





needed to design and build their robot and complete a series of "missions" related to food contamination. This terrific enrichment activity has provided wonderful learning opportunities as well as team building and problem solving skills for our students. This year the team received the "Perseverance Award" for teamwork and persistence in solving unanticipated problems. Way to go "Build Guild!".

Chefs Show Students "Cooking Matters" and Can Be Fun!

Monday afternoons find the hallways of Nativity saturated with the most mouth

watering aromas. For two six week time periods this Fall, Foodlink is sponsoring a course for our girls and boys entitled "Cooking Matters". Every week Nativity students work with local chefs and Foodlink nutritionists. They discuss a variety of topics around healthy eating. They also prepare and try new recipes. After class students take the recipes home to encourage their



families to participate in healthy eating. One of the most interesting recipes the students prepared and really enjoyed (despite some initial hesitancy) was a blueberry and spinach

smoothie. The Cooking Matters course is sponsored by Foodlink through a Community Health Foundation Grant.



Three Students On The Move

The focus of a Nativity education is to prepare our students to be eligible for entrance into one of the excellent local high schools. To this end, three of our students have already accomplished that objective, albeit a year earlier than planned. Alex Blagrove and Quinton Dang applied and were accepted into the McOuaid Jesuit middle school, both achieving exceptionally high scores on the entrance exam. In addition, Grace Keller-Gorman, a very artistically talented young lady, was also accepted into the 8th grade at the School of



the Arts. While we will miss them, it was wonderful to see them move on to the school of their choice, and they serve as terrific examples for the rest of our students.

Artists on Campus

Over this first quarter Nativity Preparatory had three Volunteer Art students from Nazareth College. The graduate students worked with twelve of our Nativity students for a four week period of time. The project was to design a painting that would represent one of our five virtues: respect, responsibility, grati-

tude, spirituality or scholarship. The students' completed work will be on display in the school hallway.

Nativity 2011 Summer Program

Summer Camp is an important component of the Nativity model and it is safe to say that our students had a very rewarding experience thanks to Loretta Yatteau, our Camp Director, and a staff including several of our teachers, interns and three counselors. This unique three week program is designed to ensure academic continuity and enrichment for our students during the summer months as well as provide unique experiences that enhance their leadership skills, personal values



and team-building. The camp ran from mid-July through early August and was divided into two parts: 1) a two week academic and enrichment day camp that was held at McQuaid Jesuit which included a morning session focused on academics

and afternoon enrichment activities and community service programs; and 2) a six day overnight camp experience at Camp Asbury where the students spent mornings focused on summer reading and journaling and afternoons enjoying various camp activities such as swimming, canoeing, hiking, archery, and a ropes course. The students were also assigned to crews responsible for the meals: setting the table, cooking and cleaning up.
