Blessed with a rich diversity of students

This year Nativity enjoyed record enrollment with 25 new students entering in September bringing total enrollment to 50 students with an equal number of boys and girls across 5th through 8th grade. We expect enrollment to continue to increase over the next few years targeting full enrollment of 80-90 students. Over 95% of our students qualify for the federal free or reduced meal program and attendance continues to be excellent averaging 97%. One of the gifts we enjoy is tremendous



diversity. Our students come from families representing over 20 nationalities including new refugee families from Russia, Bosnia, Nepal, Sudan, Kenya and Zambia. We have Catholics, Christians, Muslims and Hindus. This diversity has provided us with a wonderful opportunity to learn about other cultures and religions, not just through textbooks, but through lived experiences. This provides a wonderful opportunity for true understanding and acceptance as our students grow into adulthood.



Enrichment program gets the mind and body moving

Once their homework is completed each day, Nativity students participate in a wide variety of enrichment activities that are scheduled in six-week long blocks throughout the year with multiple options provided during each block. These activities are designed to expose students to a wide variety of cultural and recreational activities, encouraging students to explore their unique skills and passions. Since each activity is scheduled multiple times each week, the student can get involved in two or three different activities, and many spill over into Saturday sessions. Our Americorp teaching interns oversee the program and coordinate the many paid and volunteer instructors and coaches needed for the program.

So far this year, students have been able to have experiences in activities from Lego



robotics to Chess Club to singing in a Choral Group. CYO basketball, cross country, step dancing, a WiiFit exercise program and floor hockey has helped get the heart pumping; and sewing and the Young Artists Club (for those interested in creative writing and the visual arts) has provided opportunities for artistic expression.

Many of these activities expand out into the community. The "Build Guild" participated





in the Lego Robotics competition at McQuaid Jesuit against other middle school teams; students also participated in CYO basketball; and the Choral Group sang for the St. Boniface Twilighters at a Christmas luncheon and will perform during mass at St. Boniface during Catholic Schools Week. The Step Team also had its first demonstration performance.



The Chess Club plans to have some of its members attend competitions in the Spring. The Young Artists Club will be visiting the Writers & Books organization to hear from some writers about their craft and to further work on their own pieces.

These programs are a vital component of a Nativity education, plus they're fun!
