# Cease Fire Has Been Issued Between Israel and HAMAS in Gaza

Conflict in Gaza: A 2024-2025 Update



On October 7, 2023, a group called Hamas attacked Israel, killing about 1,200 people and taking more than 240 people hostage. They did this through mass shootings, kidnappings, and rocket attacks on both regular citizens and soldiers.

In response, Israel started military actions in Gaza to try to stop Hamas. These actions have caused a lot of damage, and many people are suffering. By January 2024, over 26,000 people in Gaza had been killed, and thousands more were

injured. The Israeli military used airstrikes, ground operations, and blockades, which affected many

civilians. In January 2025, Hamas and Israel agreed to a ceasefire, which means both sides stopped fighting for a while. As part of the deal, they exchanged prisoners and allowed aid to reach people in Gaza. Thousands of Palestinians were able to return to areas in Gaza that had been badly damaged by the fighting. Even though the ceasefire has helped bring some peace, there are still challenges to making sure it lasts and improving the situation for everyone affected by the conflict.



The situation in Gaza is still bad, with many people needing help. International groups are calling for more aid and are working to find ways to reduce the violence. Tensions are also growing in nearby areas, which could make things worse. The status of the conflict is still changing, and people are working to find a lasting solution. Both Israeli and Palestinian civilians are suffering because of the fighting. Many countries around the world are trying to help with the crisis and to bring peace to the region.



# Coaching with Passion: The Stories Behind Nativity's Volleyball and Basketball Teams

#### Coach Smith: Building a Volleyball Program from the Ground Up
